Summary

Regional: Monitor ongoing developments and maintain flexible itineraries amid airspace closures on 13th June. Monitor ongoing regional developments amid airspace closures in Israel, Jordan, Syria, Iraq, and Iran on 13th June. Following overnight aerial attacks between Israel and Iran, several countries closed their airspace as a security measure against potential further attacks. Ben Gurion Airport (TLV) announced that operations were suspended until further notice, though unverified reports suggest it could be for the coming 3-4 days. Iraq, Syria, and Jordan announced temporary airspace closures, though further attacks will almost certainly prolong closures. Maintain flexible itineraries in the coming days.


Developments

Description	Information Credibility	Source Reliability
No missile or drone strikes have been reported in Iran or Israel on 27th June, three days after both countries agreed to a US-backed ceasefire. Both Israel and Iran have abided by the ceasefire since the last breach on 24th June.	Confirmed true	Usually reliable
Israeli Defence Minister Israel Katz announced on 26th June that Israeli airstrikes would have killed the Iranian Supreme Leader Ayatollah Khamenei if the situation presented itself. Katz furthered this by stating that Khamenei went deep underground and broke off contact with the commanders. Khamenei was confirmed alive after his video message broadcasted on 26th June.	Probably true	Fairly reliable
Israel's airspace has reopened, with flights by Israeli airlines continuing. As well as domestic carriers such as El Al Israel Airlines, Israel Airlines, and Arkia Airlines, international flight carriers from Cyprus, Russia, and the United Arab Emirates have also begun operating flights from Ben Gurion International Airport (TLV).	Confirmed true	Reliable
Eastern Iran opened its airspace for domestic, international, and overflights on 26th June. Flights to and from Tehran's Mehrabad International Airport (THR) and Imam Khomeini International Airport (IKA) remain suspended.	Probably true	Reliable
Seven airlines have opened bookings for flights from Tehran from 1st July. The airlines are AJet, Emirates, Salam Air, Air Arabia, flydubai, Turkish Airlines and Oman Air.	Probably true	Fairly reliable
Open source flight information indicates that regional countries have resumed flight operations to pre-conflict levels.	Confirmed true	Usually reliable
Iran has fully restored internet, mobile, and landline services to pre-conflict levels according to the Communications Minister Sattar Hashemi on 25th June. Though difficult to verify, Iranian officials had accused Israel of infiltrating digital networks.	Probably true	Fairly reliable

Assessments

Description	Confidence
Despite alleged earlier violations, the ceasefire continues to hold, which is a marked improvement in external conflict risks between Iran and Israel. Given that both Iran and Israel agreed to the ceasefire, and that Trump appears to be discouraging Israel from further military action against Iran, we assess that all parties in the conflict desire to maintain a relative peace in the near term. Negative rhetoric between Iranian and Israeli leaders will almost certainly persist for at least the short term.	High
The operational environments in both Iran and Israel are improving since the ceasefire. While conditions in Iran remain subject to fluctuations, Israel's environment has stabilised. The operational risk ratings for both countries remain unchanged from pre-conflict levels, at HIGH for Iran and MINIMAL for Israel. Given Iran's pre-existing issues, such as frequent power outages and ageing infrastructure, Israeli airstrikes are likely to have had a significant impact on the country's ability to restore its critical infrastructure.	High
The regional operational environment deteriorated on 23rd June after Iran targeted al-Udeid Air Base, but it has since improved, as evidenced by a complete resumption of airline activity and airport operations. Any further violation of the ceasefire will almost certainly see regional countries reassess domestic security measures.	High
The long-term stability of the ceasefire remains tenuous. While the Israeli government may assess that it has met its near-term objectives, it does not appear to have completely halted Iran's nuclear programme. While diplomatic measures may help bring about a more durable peace, Iran's government may determine that it needs to pursue nuclear weapons to ensure its survival. Israel will not tolerate an Iranian nuclear weapons programme and may seek military means again to halt Iran; a resumption of Israeli airstrikes is, however, not anticipated in the short-term.	Moderate
External Conflict risks in Iran and Israel remain EXTREME. We cannot rule out the possibility of a resumption of conflict in the coming week. While neither side has demonstrated an intent to resume hostilities, an accident similar to Iran's reported launch of one missile in the morning hours (local time) on 24th June may provoke retaliation. A resumption is unlikely in the near term, since US President Trump's strong statements strongly disincentivise further fighting.	High
Security risks in other regional countries have stabilised following the announcement of the ceasefire. The attack on al-Udeid Air Base in Qatar did not elevate risks beyond its vicinity. Iran probably conducted the attack in coordination with Qatar and the United States, as evidenced by the Qatari officials closing airspace well ahead of an Iranian attack. This stable trend is set to continue.	High
